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Message from the Executive Director

The 2022-2023 hockey season has come to a conclusion in the Ontario Hockey Federation. A season that was filled with new processes, challenges and successes that all led to change improvement for the participants that commit their time, energy, passion and choice to our organization and the hundreds of Minor Hockey Associations that are part of the OHF.

In 2022-2023 season there was turmoil with Hockey Canada that affected us all. The values and experiences for the participants in the game being under scrutiny created an opportunity to become more transparent as an organization, to look inward and challenge us to lead through listening and the ability to rethink our engrained thoughts. The OHF doubled down on transparency with finances being published to the website, provided reports on incidents of Maltreatment from previous seasons and hosted all-association calls pertaining to the Hockey Canada situation, understanding the National Sport Organization and Provincial Sport Organization relationship, the Player Pathways, and Financials. There was also a a complete review on Fall player evaluations with the Minor Hockey Associations.

Transparency has always been our standard but now it is only going to increase from the OHF down to the local hockey association for the benefit of all participants. To be transparent there will be change that occurs over the next 24 months and every change or implementation is not going to be perfect.

We also saw imperfections of the Independent Third-Party investigation process implemented by Hockey Canada. It had its glitches and over the year we (Hockey Canada, HC Members, OHF Members and Associations) have fixed most of those. The process continues to get stronger but moving toward excellence is the direction we are headed.

The next 24 months will continue to be put under a microscope as we make and manage changes. I look forward to steering us in the future and continue to work with all stakeholders to service the participants that choose the great game of hockey.





Commitment to Safe Sport

Safe Sport is the new term that guides the OHF's rooted value that sport should be a welcoming environment for all and where the physical and mental safety of participants is at the forefront of our decision-making process. Although this has always been a value at the core of OHF decisions, it doesn't mean that historical practices are still the right decisions.

Since 1999 we have transitioned from the Speak Out Program to the OHF Bullying Harassment and Abuse Policy. The nature of investigations has changed over time and our policy and practices required a thorough and appropriate adjustment.

The participants should be proud that they belong to a sports organization that believes in their safety and well-being.





HEROIC MINDS





Alliance Hockey announced a partnership with Heroic Minds to offer mental health resources and support to its hockey members. Through this partnership, players, team officials, and all associated members have access to the platform developed by OHL alumnus Ben Fanelli, who overcame a traumatic brain injury before receiving the 2013 OHL and CHL Humanitarian of the Year. The platform is a mental health resource that arms users with tools and resources highlighting the direct link between life skills and sport performance.



The GTHL held two (2) PD Skill Development Days in the 2022-2023 season at Scotiabank Pond. The GTHL's PD Skill Development Full-Day Camps work to enhance fundamental skills while prioritizing fun. Players took part in two on-ice and two off-ice sessions that focus on passing, shooting, skating, and puck control. Off-ice sessions included games focused on inclusion and teamwork, and dryland activities.













The NOHA organized the Green Armband Initiative for officials under the age of 18 to reduce the harassment and abuse of hockey officials. All officials under the age of 18 will wear a green armband on their left arm to raise awareness that the harassment and abuse of officials will not be tolerated.



Bursary winners were announced, and 8 members have been selected to receive \$6,000 each to further their postsecondary education. The bursary program funded directly by MilkUP, Dairy Farmers of Ontario's youth lifestyle brand, recognizes young athletes who show leadership in building strong and healthy communities, demonstrate high academic achievement and are dedicated to and have a passion for hockey. This year's recipients include the first ever Trainer and Official too receive the bursary – both female – and 6 players.



January 2023, St. Thomas Minor Hockey Association Junior Stars U11 AA team received jerseys in a new colour with a different logo. The coaches instilled that these jerseys came with the great responsibility and expectation to become more aware and educated about the history of Residential Schools and their knowledge of Indigenous Peoples. The players would ultimately be responsible for acknowledging, accepting, and respecting all without prejudice or discrimination.





New Participants by Gender




New Participants by Division / Official Level





Participants by Season



Officiating Program

In August 2020 Hockey Canada supplied the Branches with updated curriculum materials. These updated materials focused on the 'grassroots' level of hockey. All OHF Members took advantage of this material, for both in-person and virtual clinics. In future years, the use of this centrally produced curriculum will lead to greater officiating consistency within the OHF.

Our Members have now fully transitioned their programs to reflect the changes made in 2020 to the Hockey Canada Officiating Pathway. In the 2022-23 season our Members conducted a number of newly formed clinics. The introduction of these clinics should allow for an official to progress faster, from a beginner to a Championship Official.

We will continue to focus time and efforts on the recruitment of new officials. Throughout the OHF we still have areas that are below the required numbers. Recruitment will be a primary focus as we head into the upcoming season.




