Screening: Coaches, volunteers, and officials must undergo background checks through a new centralized validation process to ensure that these individuals meet certain standards and conduct themselves in a safe manner for all.



Safe Sport Training: Organization of training for coaches, officials, and administrators to raise awareness about abuse prevention, how to recognize signs of abuse, and learn how to respond appropriately to allegations or suspicions of abuse.






Little Native Hockey League (LNHL):

Little Native Hockey League (Little NHL) tournament was started by five very special people who wanted to start a tournament for our First Nation Youth. These people were Earl Abotossaway, former Chief Jim McGregor, the late James D. Debassige, the late Reverend Leonard Self and the late Norman Debassige. The first tournament had 17 teams and a modest 200 players in Little Current. By 2018, the tournament had grown to 209 teams and approximately 3000 players. In 2024, the tournament will be held over March break in the city of Markham, with projections of over 3,500 players participating over the week.

Ontario Sledge Hockey Association (OSHA):

The Ontario Sledge Hockey Association (OSHA) is the governing body for sledge hockey in Ontario, representing over 20 clubs and 400 plus players located across most of Ontario. It is a registered non-profit organization, an associate member of the Ontario Hockey Federation, and a member of Hockey Canada. OSHA runs three regular season leagues, Junior Sledge Development, Intermediate, and Elite; offering competitive and development opportunities to players at all levels of play from beginner to elite. OSHA, in its role as the organizing body for sledge hockey in Ontario under the OHF, coordinates sledge hockey participation in the Ontario Parasport Winter Games (OPWG), and the Ontario Winter Games (OWG).




New Participants & Rate by Season




New Participants by Division / Official Level






Coaching by the NUMBERS

Participants by Division / Official Level




New Participants by Division / Official Level

OHF/OHL U15 Program of EXCELLENCE

The OHF/OHL U15 Program of Excellence is a development experience designed to educate and inform players and parents. The goals of the program include: to introduce players, families and staff to high performance hockey, the Program of Excellence and the Ontario Hockey League; to create a unique and special life and hockey experience for all players and staff involved; and to develop players and staff both on and off the ice. Players will participate in intense, high performance on and off ice sessions and seminars. On-ice sessions will be run by Hockey Canada and OHL personnel and will include practices that focus on individual skill, team tactics, small area games, and position specific.

HIGHLIGHTS

A Pathway Built for Everyone: The OHF follows Hockey Canada's officiating pathway, which emphasizes inclusivity and gender neutrality at every stage—from Introduction and Recreational to Competitive and High Performance—ensuring fair access regardless of background.


Commitment to Ongoing Development: Except for the entry-level (Level I), all officials must complete both classroom (clinical) and on-ice (practical) assessments. Recertification requires attending a clinic and passing a national exam every year, promoting consistent standards and quality.

Age & Progression Standards: Officials must be at least 16 years old to certify at Level II or above, and may only advance one level per season, ensuring steady development and readiness for more advanced roles.

Focus on Respect & Safe Environments Under Hockey Canada's policies, all referees, linespersons, and off-ice officials must be treated with courtesy and respect, aligning with wider Safe Sport principles.

RECORD CHECKS

Centralized Record Checks for the 2024-25 Season:

Ensuring Safety and Streamlined Process

What changed?

Besides screening On-Ice Officials, OHF began screening all Hockey Associations On-Ice Personnel and Volunteers.

Centralization Benefits:

Consistency: Ensured all necessary screenings occurred the same way

Efficiency: Reduced duplicate screenings across Associations.

Safety: Protected players from exposure to vulnerable individuals.

The Submission Portal: A user-friendly portal facilitated Vulnerable Sector Check and OHF Screening Declaration Form submissions. Trained Inspectors review and update HCR profiles upon approval.


The OHF has implemented some changes to the online screening submission portal in the effort of creating a more user friendly process.

One Step vs. Two Step Process

• OHF has created one direct link to submission portal to upload documents and/or complete online declaration.

Need for Better Communication

- OHF will provide automatic instant notifications of all decisions so that there is no need for them to follow up with the OHF on their submission.
- Automatic notifications will be provided by Record Check Inspectors on Incomplete decisions with a note containing specific details on their error or issue. The individual would have better information on how to resubmit their screening so that it can be completed.



Decisions	Explanation
Approved	The individual's screening has been approved and they are eligible to participate

Incomplete	The individual had either an error in their submission and/or did not provide the correct documents and is required to resubmit
Denied	The individual is ineligible to participate based on specific offence(s) on their Vulnerable Sector Check or declaration that is in violation of the OHF Screening Policy



Officiating PROGRAM

OHF Member High Performance Clinic

The OHF once again held its Member High Performance Camp November 1-3 in Cambridge. Officials were given the opportunity to officiate OHL, Junior B, and World Under-17 Pre-Competition games while receiving feedback from Officiating Coaches such as Al Kimmel, Kevin Pollock, Greg Devorski, Lance Roberts, Ken Cox, and Chris Ferreira. Throughout the weekend, Officials listened to presentations from the above Officiating Coaches, Emile Studham of EDS Education, and Dr. Marcus Gatto and Adam Martin from Pursuit Athletics Centre. Classroom sessions were focused on teamwork, fitness, nutrition, communication, conflict resolution, and attitude. The Camp serves as a stepping stone to Hockey Canada's National High Performance Camp and provides the Officials with Hockey Canada's Member High Performance qualification.

OHF Online Recertification Program

As Hockey Canada launched the Learning Lab this past season, the OHF was given the opportunity to move its current online recertification program to the new platform. After gathering feedback from all Officials and Members, it was a great success that offered Officials a new strengthened platform that provided Officials with an interactive experience while maintaining their Hockey Canada Officiating Program certification. As we move into the 2025-2026 season, we look forward to utilizing the Hockey Canada National Online Recertification Program that will be offered countrywide to all Officials.

International/National Officiating Assignments

The OHF continued to strengthen its appearance on the international stage during the 2024-2025 season, as we saw nine Officials from the OHF receive assignments at 13 IIHF events while 30 Officials received 26 Hockey Canada assignments. The OHF was also fortunate enough to send 18 Officials to Hockey Canada Camps throughout the season where Officials were able to showcase their abilities and further their development.


